

Gas station, bagel shop suspects

Nassau police and its Crime Stoppers department are looking for a man wanted for a robbery at a Franklin Square gas station.

At about 11:50 p.m. Feb. 10, the man walked into the Sunoco service station at 355 Franklin Ave. He pulled out a handgun and demanded money. The employee gave \$500 to the man, who then left the store.

The suspect is described as about 6 feet tall and 160 pounds.

Suffolk police and its Crime Stoppers department are looking for a man who stole money from a donation jar at a Patchogue bagel shop.

At about 11:50 a.m. March 14, a man walked out with a jar that contained about \$400 in donations to the Guide Dog Foundation, an organization that trains service dogs for the blind.

The man is described as in his thirties, between 5-foot-10

and 6 feet tall, with a receding hairline.

On the surveillance video, he is seen wearing blue jeans

and a blue jacket with white stripes on the sleeves.

He left the store concealing the jar under a plaid jacket.
